It is unknown when the upper floor and porch of the two-story cottage were altered. The footprint of the second floor originally matched the first floor, the hipped roof had a clipped gable and there was a pyramidal roof wall dormer. At some point the second floor was enlarged to create a gable front with a decorative vergeboard and exposed rafter tails. The windows were shortened in the new front elevation. The window size and rafter tails could indicate the alterations occurred about 1910. The front porch originally wrapped around the north and south sides, the south side has been removed and the turned posts were replaced with square pillars. A screen was added along the top of the roof.

Significant Features

- The cross gable toward the rear and window openings in that section appear to match the original.
- Decoration/vergeboards in the gable front and in the gable front dormers, it is not original but could have been added historically.
- Clapboard siding, some window trim.
- The shape of north half of the porch matches the original, it is unknown when the south half was removed or when the posts were changed, and the upper screening added.
- The south side of the building is altered from the original, the first and second floor footprint was enlarged in this section.

Condition

The cottage is in good repair no issues are apparent.
